Grab 'n Go Bags

Have a *Grab 'n Go Bag* for each person in the house. Keep it by your bed. If you need to evacuate, grab your bag and go.

Adult Bag

- Flashlight, batteries, and light sticks
- Portable radio and batteries
- Kevs (house and car)
- Money (coins and bills)
- Glasses, contacts lenses and solutions
- Medications (at least one-week supply)
- Comfortable shoes, two pairs of socks
- Comfortable clothing (sweats, extra underwear)
- Jacket or sweatshirt
- Whistle (call for help if trapped)
- Pocket knife
- Paper and pencil
- "Okay" and "Help" signs (provided by CERT)
- Emergency phone list, out-of-state contact #
- Lists of people to notify if you are injured
- Copies of important documents: insurance, identification, social security, etc.

- Small first aid kit
- Toilet articles: comb, toothbrush, toothpaste, soap, washcloth, face towel, shampoo, lotion, razor, lip balm, emery board, nail clipper, sanitary products, tissue, sunscreen, etc.
- Toilet paper
- Zip-lock bags, plastic grocery bags
- Good book, playing cards, crossword puzzles
- Work gloves, several pairs of latex gloves
- Blanket
- Plastic ground cloth
- Dust mask
- Crow bar (may need to remove debris)
- Drinking water store in a separate place (minimum one gallon per person)
- Food
- Snacks (granola bars, trail mix, peanut butter)



Seniors or Disabled Bag

These items are in addition to the Adult Grab 'n Go Bag.

- Food for special diet needs
- Batteries for hearing aids, wheelchair, etc.
- List of style and serial # of medical devices
- Special supplies: oxygen, catheters, etc.
- Prescriptions for eyeglasses (not older than one year)
- Personal sanitary items(Depends, disposable bags, ties, wipes)
- For guide dogs see Pet Grab 'n Go Bag.



Infant and Toddler Bags

These items are in addition to the Adult Grab 'n Go Bag.

- Formula, disposable bottles, nipples
- Diapers and wipes
- Instant baby cereal
- Bowl and spoon
- Sunscreen
- At least two changes of clothes
- Light jacket

- Thermometer
- Medicine dropper
- Pedialite, electrolyte replacement solution

Your Emergency Preparedness Kit Checklist

Government agencies will respond to community disasters, but citizens may be on their own for hours, even days, after disaster strikes. You should be prepared to take care of yourself and your family for at least three days.

Emergency Survival Kit

Store one of these at home, at work and at each child's school or daycare facility.

Dry or canned food and drinking water for three days (for each person)

Can opener

First aid supplies and first aid book Copies of important documents (birth certificates, licenses, insurance policies, etc.)

"Special needs" items for family members (infant formula, eye glasses, medications, etc.)

A change of clothing including hard soled shoes

Gloves, mask, and eye protection Sleeping bag or blanket

Battery powered radio or television NOAA All-hazard Radio

Flashlight and extra batteries

Whistle

Waterproof matches

Toys, books, puzzles, games Extra house keys and car keys List of contact names and phone numbers

Preparing Your Household for Emergencies

After a disaster, you and your family should be prepared to be on your own for at least three days. Emergency response teams will be very busy and may not be able to provide immediate care to all who need it. Here is what you can do to protect yourself.

Before a disaster

Choose a place for your family to meet after a disaster.

Choose a person outside the immediate area for family members to contact in case you get separated. This person should live far enough away so he or she won't be involved in the same emergency.

Know how to contact your children at their school or daycare, and how to pick them up after a disaster. Let the school know if someone else is authorized to pick them up. Keep your child's emergency release card up to date.

Put together an emergency supplikit for your home and workplace. If your child's school or daycare stores personal emergency kits make one for your child to keep there.

Know where the nearest fire and police stations are.

Learn your community's warning signals, what they sound like and what you should do when you hear them.

Learn first aid and CPR. Have a first aid kit, a first aid manual and extra medicine for family members.

Keep a small amount of cash available. If the power is out, ATM machines won't work.

If you have family members who don't speak English, prepare emergency cards in English with their names, addresses and information about medications or allergies. Make sure they can find their cards at all times.

Conduct drills every six months.

Make copies of your vital records and store them in a safe deposit box in another city or state. Store the originals safely. Keep photos and videotapes of your home and valuables in your safe deposit box.

Make sure family members know all the possible ways to get out of your home. Keep all exits clear.

Make sure all family members agree on an emergency plan. Give emergency information to babysitters or other caregivers. During an emergency or disaster Keep calm and take time to think.

Give assistance where needed.

Listen to your radio or television for official information and instructions.

Use the telephone for emergency calls only.

If you are ordered to evacuate, take your emergency kit and follow official directions to a safe place or temporary shelter.

After the emergency or disaster is over

Use caution in entering damaged buildings and homes.

Stay away from damaged electrical wires and wet appliances.

Check food and water supplies for contamination.

Notify your relatives that you are safe, but don't tie up phone lines. They may be needed for emergency calls.

If government disaster assistance is available, the news media will announce where to go to apply.
